

Deep River Rail Trail Field Course Summary

On Saturday, May 3, 2025, the AEG Carolinas Chapter held a successful field course with 41 attendees, led by Phil Bradley and Garett Thompson from the North Carolina Geological Survey (NCGS). We had only 4 noshows. The weather was a little muggy, but the cloud cover was nice. We had a bit of a hiccup at the start, when four of us were at the wrong trailhead for the hike, but we eventually all found each other and distributed all of the doughnuts, most of the bagels, and half of the coffee before the start of the hike.

Phil gave a great introduction of the site with lots of maps & a discussion of the historical geology. Phil explained the current hypothesis for the formation of the ca. 630-615 ma Hyco arc metavolcanics & the younger ca. 550-530 ma Albemarle arc metasediments. We then "island hopped" from rocks of the Hyco volcanic island arc to rocks of the Albemarle volcanic island arc as we traveled downstream along the Deep River.




Deep River Rail Trail Field Course Summary (cont.)

Along the way, we discussed the findings from recent NC Geological Survey mapping and age-date work in the area that led to improved hypotheses for the geologic history of the area.

One of our stops was at Faith Rock, a cliff face that towers over 50 feet above the Deep River. Legend states that in 1781, during the Revolutionary War, Patriot Andrew Hunter stole the mare of Tory leader Col. David Fanning and narrowly escaped to safety by riding the horse over the rock cliff and into the river. Faith Rock was named after the "leap of faith" Hunter took into the river to avoid a seemingly deadly fate at the hands of man. Locals fabled that the horse's hoof prints where left in the rock from where it leaped.

The major responsibilities of the Field Course Coordinator are:

- to work with the Chapter Board to schedule Chapter field courses that provide professional development hours to licensed professional geologists (with a goal of two field courses per year)
- to select and secure the field course topic, location, and leader (usually a licensed practicing Geologist who is familiar with North/South Carolina geology)
- to work with the Chapter Secretary to send out announcements of each field course

AEG Carolinas Chapter Board Elections in August

Would you like to be involved more with the AEG Carolinas Chapter?

Each year, our chapter holds elections for the four board positions: Chair, Vice Chair, Treasurer, and Secretary. The Chair serves a 2-year term and the other three positions are for 1 year. The former Chair serves for 2 years as Past Chair and remains on the board, so it comprises five geologists. Our recent Chapter Chair, Jonathan Gerst, stepped down from the role this past winter. All four board positions are open for the running. Our chapter will hold elections for all four board positions in September—so be on the lookout for your ballot!

We also have other committee member roles including **Newsletter Co-editor**, **Newsletter Contributor**, **& Chapter Meeting Coordinator** that are **open**. **And can be taken up at any time**. Please see the descriptions for each open role below. If you have any questions or would like to fill one of these roles, please email the current chapter Vice Chair, Laura Elliott, at laura.rob.elliott@gmail.com.

Chair: The Chapter Chair shall preside at all meetings of the Chapter Board and has the general powers and duties of management of the Chapter. The Chair shall be responsible to the Board, shall see that the Board is advised on all significant matters of this Chapter's business, and shall see that all orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect. The Chair shall be empowered to act, speak for, or otherwise represent this Chapter between meetings of the Board and shall be responsible for keeping the Board informed of all matters affecting the Chapter. The Chair shall coordinate with the Southeast Region Director (currently Hawkins Gagnon) and at a minimum, submit to the Region Directors' Meetings. The Chair shall ordinarily be succeeded by the previous Vice Chair. In the event that the previous Vice Chair is unable, unwilling, or unfit to serve as Chair, the Chair shall be elected by the members pursuant to the Chapter election procedures. The term of office for the Chapter Chair shall be 2 years with the option to run for additional two-year terms.

AEG Carolinas Chapter Board Elections in August (cont.)

<u>Vice Chair</u>: In the absence or disability of the Chapter Chair, and subject to any limitations imposed by the Board, the Vice Chair is appointed to and shall perform all the duties of the Chair. When so acting, the Vice Chair shall have all the powers of, and be subject to all the restrictions upon, the Chair. The Vice Chair shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as from time to time may be prescribed for him or her by the Board or the Chair. The term of office for the Chapter Vice Chair shall be a minimum of 1 year but they will ideally serve for at least one 2-year term so as to be prepared to succeed the Chapter Chair at the end of the Chair's term of office.

Treasurer: The Treasurer shall keep and maintain, or cause to be kept and maintained, full and accurate books and records of accounts of the Chapter's properties and transactions, including accounts of its assets, liabilities, receipts, disbursements, gains, losses, capital and other matters customarily included in financial statements. The Treasurer shall send, or cause to be sent, to the Chapter Board and AEG Headquarters such financial statements and reports as are required to be sent by law, by the Bylaws of AEG or by the Board. The Treasurer shall (a) deposit, or cause to be deposited, the Chapter's funds and other valuables in the name and to the credit of the Chapter with such depositaries as may be designated by the Board; (b) disburse, or cause to be disbursed, the funds of the Chapter as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements; (c) render, or cause to be rendered, to the Chair and the Board, whenever requested, an account of all transactions entered into as Treasurer and of the financial condition of the Chapter; and (d) have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed to him or her by the Board. The treasurer shall also submit the Chapter Financial Statement to AEG Headquarters the annual financial report for the Chapter as soon as possible of the start of each new year but by the end of February at the very latest. The term of office for the Chapter Treasurer shall be 1 year with the option to run for additional one-year terms.

AEG Carolinas Chapter Board Elections in August (cont.)

<u>Chapter Secretary</u>: The Secretary shall keep, or cause to be kept, the minutes of all meetings, proceedings and actions of the Board and any committees thereof. The minutes of meetings shall include the time and place that the meeting was held; whether the meeting was regular or special and, if special, how it was authorized; the notice given, if any; the names of the persons present at the meeting; and the proceedings thereof. The Secretary shall, on the written request of any member, furnish to that member a copy of meetings minutes. The Secretary shall give, or cause to be given, notice of all meetings of the Board and any committees thereof. The Secretary shall also have such other powers and duties as may from time to time be prescribed to him or her by the Board or the Chapter Chair. The term of office for the Chapter Secretary shall be one year with the option to run for additional one-year terms.

<u>Chapter Past Chair:</u> The Past Chair shall be the immediate living past Chair of the Chapter. The Past Chair shall serve as an advisor to the Chair and the Chapter Board, and will be a voting member of the Chapter Board. The Past Chair will have other powers and duties as may from time to time be prescribed to the Past President by the Board or the Chapter Chair. The term of office for the Past Chair shall be equal to the Chair's term of office.

The chapter's board of directors (BOD) is comprised of the chair, vice chair, treasurer, secretary, and past chair. The BOD makes all decisions for the chapter, with input from other non-BOD positions and other AEG members.

The following non-BOD positions are held by AEG Carolinas members:

Membership Chair: This position involves reviewing the membership lists sent to the Chapter by AEG Headquarters to see which chapter members have not renewed their membership for the year, then coordinating with the chapter board to contact the non-renewed members, find out why they haven't renewed, and attempt to get them to renew their membership.

AEG Carolinas Chapter Board Elections in August (cont.)

<u>Chapter Advisors:</u> Chapter Advisors are current members of the AEG Carolinas Chapter who have previously served in leadership roles within the Chapter, are not currently serving in an elected role on the Chapter Board, and are current members of the Chapter. The Advisors are asked to be advisors to the Chapter by the Chapter Board and serve in this capacity as long as they wish to do so or until they are asked to step down from the advisory role by the Chapter Board. The Chapter Advisors participate offer their input to the Board as appropriate. The Chapter Advisors are not allowed to vote on items requiring votes by the Chapter Board.

Newsletter Co-editor(s): This position involves coordinating the content and publication of the Carolinas Chapter newsletter, GeoNews, which is published electronically quarterly. The editor reaches out to potential content contributors and compiles all newsletter articles, flyers, and advertisements. The editor also attends virtual Carolinas Chapter Board meetings to collaborate with chapter chairs, and gives updates on newsletter progress.

<u>Newsletter Contributor</u>: Writes content for the newsletter (summaries of AEG events, geo -related news, or simply submitting advertisements for upcoming related events). This volunteer position helps keep our newsletter informative and interesting and is a way for someone with limited time to help.

<u>Chapter Meeting Coordinator</u>: Works with the Chapter Board to schedule Chapter meetings (usually one meeting per quarter), selects and secures a venue for each meeting, assists the Board in selecting a speaker for each meeting, and works with the Chapter Secretary to send out announcements of each meeting.

<u>Social Chair:</u> This position involves working with the Chapter Board to schedule Chapter social events (i.e.: meet-ups at breweries, sporting events, etc.) with a goal of at least two social events per year held in varying areas of the Carolinas, selecting and securing the social event location, and working with the Chapter Secretary to send out announcements of each social event.

BRENDAN'S ABSTRACT


In September 2024, Hurricane Helene brought intense rainfall and widespread flooding to western North Carolina, creating significant challenges for dam owners, emergency responders, and community leaders. Nearly a year after the storm, we take a closer look at how three high-hazard dams — North Fork, Bee Tree, and Lake Lure — were affected and what their performance reveals about infrastructure resilience. Based on direct involvement in dam-safety operations during the storm, Brendan will outline the approach taken before, during, and after the event. The session will conclude with lessons learned and recommendations for enhancing dam resilience in the face of future, extreme, weather events.

FIELD TRIP DESCRIPTION:

We will meet at Santee Cooper's Corporate Complex to ride share (limiting the number of vehicles going into the station. Then the first stop is the Jefferies Hydroelectric Station, where station personnel will describe the history of Santee Cooper, how the station, dams, and dikes were built, and how they get their inflow, etc. The tour will include the lock system for transport between Lake Moultrie and the Tail Race Canal (headwaters of the East Branch of the Cooper River). An overview of the geology and hydrogeology of the area (with maps) will be provided, and how it was conducive to the facility. The dam, locks, turbines, etc. will all be visible.

The second stop is the Ash Pond at Jefferies, which is currently being "closed" under the State Closure Plan approved by SCDES and under the guidance of the Federal CCR Rule by removing ash for beneficial use and landfill disposal. We will observe the ash pond, decant pond, and associated groundwater monitoring wells. Adam and Melanie will talk about the beneficial use of the ash, with further discussion about the geology of the site and the groundwater monitoring network for both state and federal regulations. Again, we will use maps and visuals for discussion, and then head back to the Corporate Complex to retrieve vehicles on the way to Old Santee Canal Park (OSCP).

A barbecue lunch will be set up in the Oak Room of the Interpretive Center at OSCP., Brad Sale, Director of the Park, will provide an overview and history of the Park, including all the attempts of a canal system (because the geology and water shed were advantageous) due to the bluffs providing a strategic advantage along the river; the artifacts, mineral and fossil collections at the park, and the kiosks around the park.

Brad will then lead a tour of Fort Fairlawn, where at about 3:00 PM participants will be able to use the Scavenger Hunt brochure for a self-guided tour of the remainder of the Interpretive Center, Berkeley Museum, and Boardwalks, which have outcrops of local geology. Canoes rentals are available for a small fee, and though a tour of the inside isn't offered, there is an Antebellum house -- the Stoney Landing House -- on the bluff overlooking the Tail Race Canal.





FIELD TRIP DESCRIPTION:

The field trip will visit several spots of geologic significance in the Harrisville 7½-minute quadrangle. This area includes some outstanding exposures from several different geologic terranes and time periods, including meta-argillites of the Proterozoic-aged Carolina terrane, sedimentary rocks of the Late-Triassic-age Wadesboro sub-basin, massive Early-Jurassic-age diabase dikes (some of the largest in the Southeast US), and unconsolidated Coastal Plain sediments previously recognized as Middendorf and Pinehurst Formations. Time-permitting, we may also visit some unique historic sites related to North Carolina's role in the American Revolutionary War.

TYLER'S BIO:

Timothy "Tyler" Clark has worked in North Carolina as a geologist for 33 years. After completing his undergraduate work at N.C. State, he became a geologist with the North Carolina Geological Survey (NCGS), eventually becoming the Chief Geologist and Assistant State Geologist of North Carolina. During his tenure at the NCGS, Tyler completed a Master's degree at Duke University on the Durham sub-basin of the Deep River Triassic basin deposits of the eastern North Carolina Piedmont. Tyler volunteered his time as Secretary-Treasurer of the Carolina Geological Society for over 12 years, running the Society's 2011 field trip to examine Triassic rocks of the Sanford sub-basin of the Deep River Triassic basin. He also served as Chair of the AEG Carolinas Chapter in 2005-2006. After a 2-year relocation to Munich, Germany, Tyler returned to North Carolina as an earth science professor at Wake Tech Community College and Western Carolina University. 

PRESENTATION SYNOPSIS

Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a class of constituents of increasing concern and regulation. Among many other sources, PFAS constituents are found in landfill leachate, which is predominantly disposed of at wastewater treatment plants. PFAS concentrations in landfill leachates from across North Carolina were used in conjunction with wastewater treatment plant flows to determine the potential effect that different leachates have on the discharges at wastewater plants.

Joan Smyth is Vice President and Senior Hydrogeologist for Smith Gardner, Inc. based in Raleigh, North Carolina. Her focus is the solid-waste sector, and she provides consulting for landfill permitting and water-quality monitoring, assessment, and remediation.
